Safety is no accident!

Our club secretary is sent the General Liability packet each November. It is a colorful folder full of important insurance information, and it's usually passed on to the Safety Coordinator in your club. Does OPK have a Safety Coordinator? If so, WHO IS IT? Does anyone know? I don't know, and I'm on the OPK Board.

This member is usually in the insurance or legal profession. This person is interested in keeping the club out of trouble with its fundraising events and community service projects and can be a valuable asset as your club's Safety Coordinator.

The Safety Coordinator's responsibilities include:

1. Understanding the Kiwanis International General Liability Policy.
2. Educating the club about what is and is not covered by insurance.
3. Consulting with the board or project committee about possible hazards and how to eliminate them or transfer the risks (i.e., any alcohol-related activity requires a separate Liquor Liability Policy)

4. Completing and issuing Certificates of Insurance when needed.
5. Attending events and being prepared to make on-the-spot corrections.
6. Handling claims by obtaining full details and reporting them promptly.
7. Having a member overseeing club activities with an eye on safety protects your club from lawsuits and helps control the rising cost of insurance.
8. Each club should appoint a Safety Coordinator who will have many resources to help support this position. There is a District contact for each District. Do we all know who this is, and are we using him?

3. Attend two (2) Inter-clubs AND one (1) Division Council Meeting
4. Attend your club or division installation or the Governor's Official Visit
5. Attend a Sponsored Organization Meeting or Convention.
6. Attend a Mid-Year Conference or District Convention.

Recognition for the Kiwanian

The philosophy of results oriented recognition and reinforcement is the central focus of the awards program for achievement in membership development.

Ring of Honor

1. Participate in the new member's orientation session.
2. Greet club members as they arrive for three meetings.
3. Attend one of the following: a Kiwanis inter-club, a division or district event, or sponsored youth meeting.
4. Attend a club board of directors meeting or a meeting of the new member's assigned committee.
5. Participate in a service or fund-raising activity.

Achiever's Pin

The Achievers Pin, which was introduced during the 1997-1998 administrative year, is available for individuals who recruit three new members within an administrative year.

Ruby K Pin

The Ruby K is available for recruiting at least five members to Kiwanis anytime during a Member's Kiwanis career, whether for one's home club or any other club
